





One PhD Scholarship for research in adult social care in England

Personal Social Services Research Unit (PSSRU) and the Tizard Centre, School of Social Policy and Social Research (SSPSSR) at the University of Kent

Deadline: Friday 27th November 2020 (23.59) Interviews to be held: Friday 11th December 2020

We are offering one <u>full-time</u> PhD scholarship to be based in the <u>Personal Social Services Research</u> <u>Unit (PSSRU)</u> and the <u>Tizard Centre</u> in the School of Social Policy and Social Research (SSPSSR), University of Kent. The studentship is funded by the <u>NIHR School for Social Care Research</u> (NIHR SSCR).

The studentship is available on a full time basis only.

The doctoral student must conduct research relevant to adult social care practice in England and in line with the NIHR SSCR's <u>Business Plan</u>. NIHR SSCR outlines that the term 'adult social care' refers to provision of personal and practice care and support that people may need because of their age, illness, cognition, disability or other circumstances. It also includes support for family members or other unpaid carers. Important aims are to help people remain independent, retain their dignity and achieve a better quality of life.

Particular areas of interest within PSSRU and the Tizard Centre related to social care include:

- Transition in Social care: e.g. Social care needs and quality of life outcomes of adults moving between services and their family carers, and of adults moving from inpatient to community based settings, with a particular focus on the experiences of individuals with intellectual disabilities and/or autism
- 2. **Physical and emotional well-being:** e.g. Supporting health and wellbeing among people with intellectual disabilities and/or autism, people with mental health conditions, and their families and staff
- 3. **High quality services for better quality of life outcomes**: e.g. Evaluating the impact and costs of implementing person-centred approaches, such as active support, in community-based services for people with intellectual disabilities, autistic people and/or people with dementia
- 4. **Living a full adult life**: e.g. Exploring social, leisure and relationships opportunities for adults across all social care groups, with a particular focus on autonomy and the extent to which adults are supported to live fulfilled lives on their own terms.

Only proposals directly and substantially related to adult social care will be short-listed.

The successful applicant will be expected to participate in activities organised by NIHR SSCR, particularly activities that involve other PhD students under this programme at other universities, and, as appropriate, other National Institute of Health Research (NIHR) and NIHR Academy activities. The successful applicant will work closely with Dr Karen Jones at PSSRU and Prof Chrissie Roger, Prof Julie Beadle-Brown, Dr Michelle McCarthy and Dr Nick Gore among others at the Tizard Centre at the University of Kent.

Funding

Funding will be provided for a studentship starting in January 2021, and includes:

- a stipend of £15,500 per year;
- EU/home PhD registration fees as set by the University¹; and
- up to £10,000 across the three years for reasonable and justified research costs.

Application process

In order to be considered for the studentship, applicants should apply via the University of Kent's <u>online application system</u> by **Friday 27**th **Novmeber (23.59)** and ensure that all documentation including references are submitted on time. As part of the application process applicants will be asked to submit a research proposal explaining the work to be undertaken during the studentship that is in line with the NIHR SSCR's business plan and the research interests of PSSRU and Tizard Centre (maximum 2,500 words including references). The research proposal should explore potential plans for remote data collection during the coronavirus pandemic.
