Medway

Our Medway campus combines historic and contemporary buildings to create a unique 21st-century study space. To support our professionally focused courses, there are fantastic facilities, and the presence of two other universities on the site makes for a bustling, friendly environment. The towns of Chatham and Rochester, with its magnificent cathedral (where you graduate!), are nearby, while the waterfront is a great place to relax with friends.



Our European centres

Our Brussels School of International Studies gives postgraduate students the chance to study in English in the ‘capital of Europe’. We offer courses in the fields of international relations, conflict, development, migration and law that make the most of our contacts with organisations such as NATO, the EU and the European Commission. Many of our alumni now work in key roles in influential organisations around the world.

At our Paris School of Arts and Culture, postgraduate students study courses in the arts and humanities in a city that has been at the heart of European culture for centuries. With Paris as their classroom, students are taught in English by Kent’s internationally respected academics, who bring theory to life with trips around the city. Students also have access to Paris’ libraries, museums and galleries.

A very convenient choice close to campus shops and the central plaza, Becket Court offers en-suite, part-catered accommodation.



Keynes College/Houses/Flats

A stone's throw from the main shops, bistros and bars on campus. The flats and houses offer self-catered accommodation, while Keynes College offers part-catered.



Tyler Court A/B/C

Located on central campus, with bright rooms and easy access to 'the slopes' for picnics or sledging, when it snows! All accommodation is en suite and self-catered.



Darwin College

Close to the centre of campus, Darwin has its own bar and bistro, Origins, and a rose garden where you can relax or study. It offers self-catered accommodation.



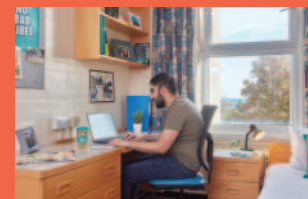
Park Wood Houses/Flats

Costs are rounded up to the nearest pound. They are for guidance only. Prices for 2023/24 will be available from January 2023.

Paying your fees

Tuition fees are charged for each year of study and are due at the start of the academic year. It is possible to pay in two instalments, the first due on or before registration weekend and the second by 1 December that academic year.

Other costs

Alongside your tuition fees you will have other academic costs, such as printing credits and text books. There may be additional costs depending on your course.

Where fees are regulated (such as by Research Councils UK), they will be increased by an amount up to the permitted increase.

**EU students pay the same rate as other international students for programmes in Kent and Medway Medical School and Medway School of Pharmacy. EU PhD students pay the same rate as other international students.

MEET HAMNA



“From the outset, I was made to feel a part of the Centre for Journalism family, all the staff were very understanding. I didn’t feel that I was alone in this new country and was able to get help when I needed it.”

Having worked as a journalist back home in Pakistan, Hamna Baig decided she needed to improve her skill set to take the next step in her career.

Discovering Kent’s Multimedia Journalism course, she knew it was the one for her: “Alongside your Master’s, you can also get an NCTJ diploma, which gives you an edge when looking for a role in journalism. I was also glad that Medway was close to London.”

Taking practical modules in print, radio, TV and online journalism, as well as gaining data journalism and research skills has diversified Hamna’s skill set. While

securing an internship at KMTV, a regional TV station in Kent will help her to fulfil her ambition to move into broadcast journalism when she returns to Pakistan.

Alongside her studies, Hamna was determined to make the most of being in the UK: “I visited the Canterbury campus, Dover and some of Kent’s beaches. I also visited friends in London and went on a trip to the Lake District.” And journalistic skills aren’t the only skills Hamna gained during her studies: “I’ve learnt to cook from scratch and am a really good chef now!”
