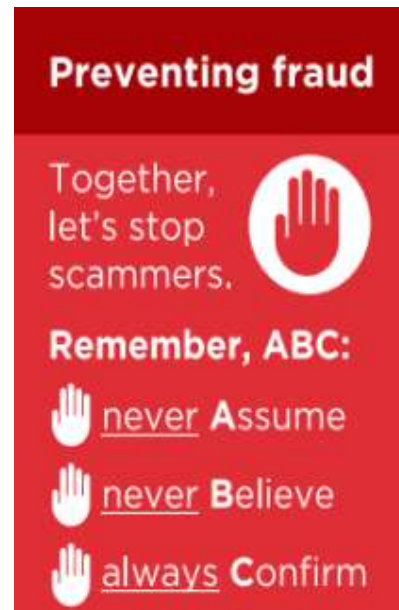
Fake Emergency Alarm Email Scam

Following on from previous alerts about the recent Emergency Alerts test, it has been reported that scammers are posing as the government asking for feedback with fake links to a survey.

Even if it has the hallmarks of a trustworthy email, upon closer inspection, you will find the message is from a spoofed email address.

The government has confirmed it is not sending emails asking for feedback.
